

Arden University Harvard Referencing Quick Guide

The Arden University (AU) Harvard Guide to Harvard Referencing provides guidance on how to reference materials for assignments in a clear and consistent manner. This quick guide covers some of the basics of AU Harvard Referencing, if you require guidance on referencing a type of source that is not covered in this guide, please see the <u>AU Complete Harvard Guide</u>.

As a student it is important that you familiarise yourself with the referencing conventions associated with AU Harvard Referencing. It is an Author-Date referencing system, and all statements, arguments, theories, opinions, conclusions etc. taken from another author's work (print, online or multimedia) should be cited, whether the work is directly quoted, paraphrased, or summarised. Paraphrasing is integrating another person's ideas into your work by rewriting an argument using your own words, phrasing, and interpretation, whilst maintaining the original meaning, and giving proper credit to the author. Guidance on appropriate use of paraphrasing, summarising and quotation in academic writing is available in your Student Handbook.

AU Harvard Referencing is a two-part process:

- 1. In-Text Citations
- 2. Reference List

In-Text Citations

In-text citations consist of the last name of the author, the year of publication, and a page number if relevant (direct quotations) e.g.,

Theory arises out of practice and the two are therefore inextricably linked (Gross, 2015).

Reference List

The reference list is a list of the all the sources cited in the text. Your reference list must be ordered alphabetically by author's surname.
