


OSCOLA is the referencing system used by single-honours LLB students. It consists of footnotes and an end-of-text reference list

More This is the hierarchy of authoritative law reports. You should **Primary or Secondary?** always try to use the most authoritative The Law Reports **Primary Sources** accounts in your essays! In Law, primary sources include domestic and foreign law cases, Acts, Statutory instruments (SI) and Bills, and EU legislation. Essentially, documents that enact the law itself Weekly Law **Secondary Sources** Reports and All Secondary sources encompass books, articles, parliamentary papers, and newspapers. They are **England Reports** texts that criticise or comment upon the law Reference List Less OSCOLA requires Primary and Secondary sources to be kept All other Law authoritative in separate lists in your end-of-text references. File your Primary sources under Table of Authorities, and your Reports


BRACKETS!

Use square brackets [] for years where the year is required to find the report
Use round brackets () for years where you can find the report from the volume number

Neutral Citations



Since 2001, cases have been assigned a Neutral Citation in addition to the law report information. This indicates where the case was *heard*, not where the case was *reported*



Citing Statutes

You should use the full title the first time you reference an act. For all subsequent references, you can use the abbreviation e.g. HRA 1998
